Courses Numbered 000-599

Aerospace Studies

FROM: AERO 099 – Aerospace Studies Lab. (0) I, II. ~~The leadership laboratory for aerospace studies. Students will receive leadership training and experience as well as training in Air Force customs and courtesies. This course runs concurrently with AERO 100, 200, 300, and 400 classes; is required for all cadets; and includes mandatory physical fitness training.~~

TO: AERO 099 – Aerospace Studies Lab. (0) I, II. Leadership laboratory for aerospace studies. Students receive leadership training and experience as well as training in Air Force customs and courtesies. Runs concurrently with the AERO 100-, 200-, 300-, and 400- level classes; required for all cadets; and includes mandatory physical fitness training.

RATIONALE: To increase clarity and accuracy of the course description.

TO: ECON 524 – Sports Economics. (3) I. An economic analysis of professional and amateur sports. Pay determination of professional athletes, monopsony power of owners, discrimination, the importance of leagues, competitive balance, antitrust issues, collective bargaining, the financing of sports stadiums, and current economic issues in sports. Pr: ECON 120.

RATIONALE: The Course Catalog states that this course may not be counted toward economics major. This course IS counted toward an economics major.

FROM: ENGL 310 – Introduction to Literary Studies. (3) I, II, S. Elements of literary form and style: an introduction to criticism for English majors. Intended as a first course in the analysis of form and technique, an introduction to ~~literacy~~ terms commonly used in later courses, and practice in critical writing. Readings from a broad range: poems, plays, essays, and novels.

TO: ENGL 310 - Introduction to Literary Studies. (3) I, II, S. Elements of literary form and style: an introduction to criticism for English majors. Intended as a first course in the analysis of form and technique, an introduction to literary terms commonly used in later courses, and practice in critical writing. Readings from a broad range: poems, plays, essays, and novels.

RATIONALE: Correcting a typo in the course description: “literacy” should be “literary”.

Geography

FROM: GEOG 535 – Fundamentals of Climatology. (3) II. An examination of climatology on global, regional, and local scales, with emphasis on the physical processes and environmental factors that influence and control climate. Climatic change and its impact on human activities are explored. Pr.: GEPG 221.

TO: GEOG 535 – Fundamentals of Climatology. (4) II. An examination of climatology on global, regional, and local scales, with emphasis on the physical processes and environmental factors that influence and control climate. Climatic change and its impact on human activities are explored. Pr.: GEPG 221.

RATIONALE: The proposed change follows a departmental decision to no longer teach GEOG 321, which was listed as the recommended prerequisite for Fundamentals of Climatology. The proposed change is to add one additional credit hour and establish a formal laboratory component for the class. In prior course offerings, students have done eight out-of-class exercises designed to develop their ability to do climatic data analysis. GEOG 321 was a laboratory class with a number of exercises designed to assist students in active learning about the atmosphere, weather, and climate. These two sets of existing exercises will be merged to establish the content for the laboratory exercises in GEOG 535.

Journalism and Mass Communications

FROM: MC 396 – ~~Mass Communication Research~~. (3) I, II, S. ~~This course focuses on the formulation of mass communication research and design, data collection and analysis, and the measurement of public opinion.~~ Pr.: 2.5 GPA on 30 credit hours, ~~MC 110~~, completion of a math or statistics course.

TO: MC 396 – Strategic Communication Research. (3) I, II, S. Methods and procedures involved in the formulation of research problems specific to strategic communication. Examines the process of inquiry, elements of the scientific method, the design of research in quantitative and qualitative studies, as well as ethics of conducting research. Pr.: 2.5 GPA on 30 credit hours, MC 120 or MC 180, completion of a math or statistics course.

RATIONALE: Change course name and description to update course to current practices.

DROP: KIN 122 – Flag Football. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 123 – Soccer. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 124 – Softball. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 126 – Volleyball I. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 127 – Volleyball II. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

DROP: KIN 152 – Tennis II. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 154 – Tumbling and Floor Exercise. (1) I, II, S. For students in the College of Arts and Sciences, no more than 4 credit hours in lifetime sports and exercise activity classes may be applied toward a degree.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 435 – Sport and Contemporary Society. (3) I, II. An analysis of sport and its role in contemporary society. Course creates a greater awareness of the social significance of sport in society and fosters the capacity to use critical thinking in the analysis of significant sport issues. Pr.: SOCIO 211.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

The focus of the class is on developing listening skills and learning to write brief papers using the new language that has been acquired. ~~Performances are provided by university ensembles, faculty artists, and special guests.~~ Pr.: Limited to non-music majors.

TO: MUSIC 160 – Music Listening Laboratory. (2) I, II, S. A basic introduction to music. Overview of Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Classic, Romantic, and Twentieth Century stylistic periods; elements of music (melody, rhythm, harmony, form, timbre); and instrument recognition. The focus of the class is on developing listening skills and learning to write brief papers using the new language that has been acquired. Pr.: Limited to non-music majors.

RATIONALE: Music Listening Lab was offered for more than twenty years as a face-to-face lecture/laboratory experience, coordinated by music faculty and presented to more than 200 students each semester. With the increase in students taking advantage of online learning opportunities, as well as a decrease in classroom space available for large music classes due to the addition of other new large courses over the past several years, we now offer Music Listening Lab through the Division of Continuing Education as an online course. This change to an online course eliminates the faculty/guest/university ensemble performance aspect of the course, but substitutes additional listening and videos.

Biochemistry

FROM: BIOCH 950 – ~~Enzyme Chemistry~~. (3) II, ~~odd years~~. ~~The following properties of enzymes are considered: structure, specificity, catalytic power, mechanism of action, multienzyme complexes, kinetics, regulation, and pacemaker properties in multienzyme systems.~~ Pr.: BIOCH 765.

TO: BIOCH 950- Advanced Topics in Protein Science. (3) II, even years. Advances in protein biochemistry, including protein structure determination, dynamics, folding, stability, enzyme mechanism and regulation. PR: BIOCH 765, BIOCH 790.

RATIONALE: The new course name and description will better reflect the scope of the course, which will include enzymes, but also other classes of proteins and will emphasize recent major advances in the protein science field. The course will now be offered in the spring semester of even years, instead of odd years.

RATIONALE: We propose no longer cross-listing ENGL 662 and THTRE 662. The courses are no longer comparable. Therefore we wish to delete “**Cross-listed THTRE 662**” from the description of the course. We have consulted with Theatre, who supports the change.

DROP: KIN 630 – Design and Analysis of Exercise and Sport Equipment. (3) On sufficient demand. and effectiveness of equipment now available on the open market and to consider potential improvements in design. Pr.: A grade of C or higher in KIN 310, 330, & 335.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Spring 2012

DROP: KIN 700 – Physical Culture in the Western World. (3) I. A seminar on selected topics in the historical and philosophical foundations of physical culture in western civilization. Pr.: Three hours of Western Heritage.

RATIONALE: This course has not been taught for several years and we do not intend to offer it in the future.

FROM: GEOG 702 – Computer Mapping & Geographic Visualization. (3) II. Basic cartographic principles, advanced methods for representing spatial data, and practical applications of thematic maps, animated and Internet-based maps, and geographic visualization techniques. Students will prepare a series of maps and visualization products using modern cartographic and illustration software. Pr: ~~GEOG 302.~~

TO: GEOG 702 – Computer Mapping & Geographic Visualization. (3) II. Basic cartographic principles, advanced methods for representing spatial data, approaches for exploratory spatial data analysis, and practical applications of thematic maps, animated and Internet-based maps, and geographic visualization techniques. Students will prepare a series of maps and visualization products

using modern geographic information system and illustration software. Pr: GEOG 508.

RATIONALE: Proficiency with geographic information system software and related data manipulation methods – beyond basic mapping – has grown in importance for implementing a variety of geographic visualization techniques and exploratory spatial data analysis methods. This change, which includes a slight modification to the course description, replaces GEOG 302 (Cartography & Thematic Mapping) with GEOG 508 (Geographic Information Systems I) as the sole pre-requisite.
